The Aftermath conference series is the highlight of Monash University's program in Holocaust and Genocide studies led by the Australian Centre for Jewish Civilisation (ACJC). This interdisciplinary and cross-faculty program offers students at undergraduate and postgraduate levels the opportunity to study themes relating to the Holocaust, genocide, reconciliation, post-conflict and genocide prevention. The academic program also features several overseas units which travel to Europe to explore post-Holocaust memory and to Rwanda and South Africa to experience challenges in the aftermath of conflict. Student and academic research is supported by a range of scholarships and resources including the archives of the USC Shoah Foundation.

The Aftermath conference series in Holocaust and Genocide studies revitalises the memory of Dr Jan Randa – a scholar, teacher, lover of Hebrew culture, survivor of the Holocaust and post-war immigrant to Australia.
